### **BAPTISM GROUP REPORT 2018-19**

This Group continues to help families wishing to bring their children for Baptism and to encourage them to become involved in church activities. From January to December 2018, 28 children were baptised at St John's. We have baptised 5 more little ones since January this year, 4 are already booked in for the coming months with a further 6 who are still deciding on a suitable date. We have continued to offer preparation sessions monthly during the year and have maintained the previous format which includes a presentation of all the activities taking place at St John's and gives them the opportunity to look more carefully at the promises they will be making on behalf of their children when they are baptised, in particular bringing their children to church regularly. We have continued to invite families to attend the next All Age Service following the Baptism to collect their Baptism Certificates and receive a welcome from the whole congregation. Sadly this invitation is not always taken up, and we still have 8 Certificates from last year awaiting collection. More baptism families have been attending Tiny Tots and we have tried to encourage participation in our main festivals (such as Mothering Sunday, Harvest etc.) by sending out special invitations, as well as inviting them to our Children's Celebration Services. It was encouraging to see some of them also coming along to our recent Messy Church which proved very popular.

Linda Gair has continued to organise the distribution of Baptism Anniversary Cards which is greatly appreciated, but we are always on the lookout for new helpers with the card delivery as we have quite a large area to cover. Please let us know if you would be willing to

deliver cards in your road as this would be of great help. We are also lucky to have a special team of Baptism Helpers who are on duty at Baptism Services. However, we really need some new helpers as several of our previous helpers have had to retire – please let us know if you would like to join our team – services are usually the first and third Sundays of the month at 11.30, so it's not that frequent, and it is so encouraging for new families to be welcomed by a friendly face. We are very grateful, also, to our team of organists who provide very valuable musical accompaniment at Baptism Services and also to those in our team who help to run the Baptism Preparation sessions with the Clergy.

Invitations to the Remembrance Service in November are sent to the families of the bereaved where our Clergy have officiated at the funerals during the past year. We have found that this Service provides a focus for the bereaved and provides comfort to the families.

### **REPORT FROM THE COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE MARCH 2019**

The Communications Committee of the PCC is responsible for all the various aspects of communication within Boxmoor Parish and for the parish's representation to the wider world. Our remit includes the magazine, newsletter, website, Facebook page, publicity including posters and banners, and articles in the local press. The vicar is keen that all publicity material should have the same parish logo, as our "brand."

By the time of the APCM the committee will have met 6 times during the current church year, the meeting on 25 February having been devoted to a deeper consideration of the way in which we communicate. I should like to take this opportunity to thank committee members for their participation and their efforts to carry out the various communications

tasks. Sally-Anne Bates has done an excellent job of editing the magazine every month, as she has done for the last 40 years and more. This takes up a lot of her time and we appreciate her work. Printing is now done in the parish office and Alan Munford organises the distribution. Annie Mitchell has taken a break from the weekly newsletter, but we are grateful for her dedication to it over many years. The newsletter is at present being produced by the vicar and Hilary Kemp in the Parish Office. It is available online to those who request this.

After many trials and tribulations, the new parish website went live before Christmas and gives us a much more modern presence online. Many thanks are due to Stacey Barton for setting it up and to the vicar for much of the content. We acknowledge that it is still to some extent a “work in progress,” that more content is needed, and responsibility will be designated for routine updating. The St John’s Facebook page has been operated by Stacey Barton, Anne Lyne and Alan Munford. Our page now has 235 followers (up from 174 last year). Information about events and some services are “shared” with other local Facebook pages for wider publicity. We are trying to keep our page relevant to the church seasons by temporary updates of the cover picture and to include more about the life of the church as well as advertising events.

I have developed a relationship with local press, including the Gazette and Boxmoor Direct to publicise significant services, seasons, or events. However, the Gazette has reduced their Faith News section. Alan Munford managed to get the Summer Fayre featured on BBC Three Counties Radio.

The Committee is responsible for the production and the printing of the parish Christmas card (over 6,900 copies) and Easter card (4,000 copies) distributed to homes in the parish. The Committee agrees the design/text. The card is printed in-house and Alan Munford very efficiently organises the distribution. We are indebted to volunteers who take on the various “walks” to deliver the cards and we would ask the members of the congregation to volunteer for this task, if at all possible.

Posters are usually produced by the organisers of a particular event, or the Parish Office for church services. The Communications Committee involvement is to ensure distribution/press coverage and sharing of information from St John’s with the wider public. The Committee is, as always, grateful to Alan Munford for all the work he does in publicity and communications for the parish, despite no longer being a member of the Committee. The eye-catching banners which appear outside St John’s to advertise Church Seasons or events, are organised by Alan. The noticeboards rely on Alan’s work too, along with Peter Garner. We also owe thanks to Alison Jackson (previously) and now Hilary Kemp in the Parish Office for their part in the printing of publicity material and countless other tasks. The Communications Committee can only communicate material and information which is given to us and that we need information in plenty of time if it is to go in the press. Internal communication within the parish is not always efficient. People should never assume that the Communications team actually know everything!

## **REPORT FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC**

There have been some notable musical services at St Johns during the past year.

There was of course an unforgettable memorial service to David Mitchell, with many returning choristers and subsequently we have mounted some splendid evensongs and organ recitals.

Last May the Festival Evensong included magnificent Ascension music such as "God is Gone Up" (Finzi) and other challenging music.

In addition to the MASJ Friday recitals, in September there was a special series of organ concerts to celebrate the completion of payment for the new organ, starting with one where we were privileged to have James O'Donnell, Director of Music at Westminster Abbey, to play for us, in which he thoroughly explored the colours of the organ. In successive weeks, Nicholas King, Linden Innes-Hopkins and I gave further celebratory recitals, mine shared with Trumpeter David Marley and Oboist David Gladstone.

The delivery of monthly evensongs at a high musical standard has been greatly enhanced by our being joined by friends from my previous church in Chipperfield. Sadly, the numbers attending regularly in the congregation is very small.

One of the most satisfying highlights of the year was the addition of orchestral accompaniment along with the organ for the Festival of Lessons and Carols. A large congregation attended that service, and feedback was almost exclusively positive, and we hope to have the resources to maintain this innovation. This may be the point to thank all those whose financial support is always appreciated and never taken for granted.

Inspiringly led by Katherine Boyce we have now begun to develop a junior choir. It has performed already in the service on March 3<sup>rd</sup>. Katherine, with very modest assistance by Marian Davies, Jo Rhoden and me has done amazing well already with this challenging little group of about 10, rehearsing for up to an hour once a fortnight.

Regular choir numbers on Sunday mornings have recently been very small, with a number of factors bearing on this, not least the provision of musical at sister churches. A scheme has been launched, with the promise of financial support both from the PCC and MASJ to offer four choral scholarships via local schools. This is an innovative idea which I will report upon in future.

Along with the May MASJ series there will be a very exciting Festival Choral Evensong in May. Please do your very best to support this. We are delighted that Gabriella Delderfield has now passed on from being a probationer to full member of St Albans Cathedral Girls' Choir.

Thanks go to all of our loyal choir members, not least to Paul and Marian Davies whose help is invaluable.

## **2018 REPORT FROM THE FUNDRAISING COMMITTEE**

The committee met under the Chairmanship of Cathy Shaw during early 2018 to plan and organise the Parish's major fundraising events. Cathy stood down temporarily as Chair due to work commitments and the Committee subsequently combined with the Finance Committee under my Chairmanship to progress Events, the net surpluses from which are set out below:

Silent Film Night £742 (new event)  
 Churchwardens' Easter Appeal £3,902 (no appeal in 2017)  
 Summer Fayre £3,067 (new event)  
 Christmas Tree Festival £3,291 (£3,212 in 2017)  
 Countdown to Christmas Fair £3,056 (£3,206 in 2017)  
 Quiz nights £1,323 (£1,365 in 2017)

A great deal of enjoyment was generated through the hard work of the many volunteers involved and the enthusiasm of those attending. Whilst fundraising is vital the outreach achieved through these events should not be overlooked. The Silent Film Night was a case in point, bringing new people into church and providing great entertainment. The Committee's thanks go to Father Ben for organising the film and a virtuoso performance at St John's organ.

Various sales of work and produce and the sale of Church Christmas Cards raised further funds making the net total raised a very substantial £15,480.

For 2019 it has been agreed to repeat the Easter Appeal but not the Summer Fayre as the latter would clash with the regular Flower Festival, held every other year. It is hoped, however, to provide extra activities on the Saturday of the Flower Festival.

## **ST JOHN'S HALL MANAGEMENT REPORT**

The St John's Hall Management Committee met on four occasions during the year. Our Hall Cleaner handed over her duties to another lady during the year. We are pleased to report however that the cleaning responsibilities have now reverted back and are going well.

Further decoration to the Hall facilities was undertaken during the year by Mark Harbour and Andy Fisher, we are extremely grateful to them and their helpers for their efforts which included decorating the toilets in the Church.

The committee recommended to the PCC that Hall Hire Charges should be increased from 1<sup>st</sup> January 2019. This increase was agreed, and all hirers were advised of the increase during the autumn of 2018, we are pleased to say that there has been no adverse reaction to these changes.

The level of bookings for our Hall remains similar to 2017. The U3a are our largest customer and we are extremely grateful for their support.

The 'Hall Dividers' were serviced in October, the contractor advised us this time that the manufacturer of the dividers had gone into liquidation. The contractor also advised that the 'shelf life' of the dividers is estimated to be 12 to 18 months but may be longer. A contingency replacement sum of £6,000/£8,000 will be included in the 2020 Fabric Fund should they need replacing.

In conclusion we thank Graham Liddle for his work as our Hall Booking Secretary and of course our grateful thanks go to Di Tovey for undertaking the duties of Hall Caretaker.

### **Music Festival 2019 (10 to 12 May)**

It will begin with a lunchtime concert on Friday 10<sup>th</sup> May featuring a brass quintet named "J50". If the weather is good we may be able to hold it outdoors! This will be followed by the very popular concert on the Saturday morning by the Dacorum Music School.

In the evening on that Saturday the Dacorum Youth Orchestra will give a concert to include a concerto with visiting soloist and this will be conducted by Claudio di Meo.

It is also hoped to hold another Festal Evensong on the Sunday – watch out for further news.

### **Your say in running this charity**

In order to increase awareness of the nature and objectives of Music at St John's, we are planning to hold our Annual General Meeting immediately after the lunchtime concert on 4<sup>th</sup> October (over lunch!). This concert will take the form of a piano recital, given by Nicholas King, as part of our Autumn Series. We hope that more music lovers will attend and take an active part in the running of the charity.

### **Music Bursaries**

We have widened the geographic area covered by our Music Bursary Scheme to cover the whole of Dacorum.

It was very good to welcome Ruth onto the pastoral Team in December. She will be looking into our current pastoral care system over the coming months, appraising and assessing what we offer. Recommendations will then be received as to how we can grow our pastoral care in this Parish.

During 2018 our remit remained to be, and to ensure as far as possible, that people’s pastoral needs are met and that vulnerable people do not fall off the Church’s radar. Some team members are licensed to take Holy Communion to people in their homes when they are unable to come to church. All team members have people whom they visit on a regular basis. The team meets regularly to share information and bring any needs or concerns to the attention of the group for action where necessary. Due to the sensitive nature of such information, minutes of the meetings are not published and the information is kept within the team unless it is necessary to involve outside agencies, which is always done with care and with the consent of the person concerned.

## **SOCIAL COMMITTEE**

The social Committee still has the remit to organise non-profit making Social events for all ages in the Parish. To this end the Committee now includes friendship teas and St. John's lunches (formally OMO lunch).

At the pancake party last year, we had the most children we have ever had. This may have been due to the fact that Shrove Tuesday fell during half term so many of the after school activities were not taking place. We start with quizzes or a craft activity to give everyone time to arrive and then the races start. These are graded by age and the older they get the more competitive they become. It finishes with freshly made pancakes with a variety of topping.

The family fun day now runs to a tried and tested formula. After the service and coffee everything is set up outside the West doors including the barbecue and bouncy castle which is kindly provided and manned by the Hart family. While we wait for the food the children play and the adults relax, reading the papers or chatting. The barbecue meat is accompanied by salads kindly provided by members of the congregation who also provide a lovely selection of puddings.

The first weekend of October is harvest festival and for the past couple of years we have reverted to holding a harvest supper with entertainment rather than a harvest lunch. We were lucky to be entertained last time by pupils from the school where Keith Beniston's wife teaches as well as some home-grown entertainment. Once again, we were grateful to members of the congregation for providing such a lovely variety of puddings.

Our last event of the year was the OMO Christmas lunch where 24 people enjoyed a Pre-Christmas traditional meal. It was decided that in the new year that the OMO lunches should be renamed St. John's lunch club to make it more inclusive. This has now been running for three months and usually has between 12 and 20 people.

Friendship teas continues to go from strength to strength. Gill and Ian Williams do sterling work in co-ordinating the day and inviting guests and a very willing core of helpers who transport, make cakes or come along on the day to help welcome people, serve tea and clear up.

No matter which event we are running the congregation never fails to support us either by attending or providing help when asked for. The Committee is very grateful for the continuing support.

Since writing this we have held the 2019 pancake party and we were overwhelmed when 45 children turned up- ages ranging from under 2's to 10-year olds. The Vicar was run ragged organising the races in the different age groups while the ladies in the kitchen cooked and served stacks of pancakes. It certainly showed that we are a living church and hopefully we can keep building on this.

### **TINY TOTS REPORT 2018-19**

Our weekly term-time meetings and services at Tiny Tots have continued to attract new families during the year. Many of these have come along through Baptism enquiries and it has been rewarding to welcome some of these on Sundays as well, especially at our All Age Services. It is also good to see more grandparents bringing the little ones along once their mums go back to work, and to offer an opportunity for them to meet, as well as mums with their first babies. Many long-term friendships develop from introductions at Tiny Tots, and our service of Action Songs and Prayers provides a good introduction to the Christian faith and helps the little ones to feel at home in church. During the year we have seen our weekly attendance increase and we currently have between 15 to 25 little ones, with their parents and a total of just over 40 on our register. It has been particularly heart-warming to see some dads coming along recently too.

### **WORSHIP COMMITTEE**

The Worship Committee, chaired by the Vicar, has met four times during the year to discuss the liturgy, planning, and reviewing of services in the Parish and their outcomes. Membership comprises representatives from all three churches in the parish. We have said farewell to our curate, The Reverend Benjamin Weitzman, and welcomed the return of The Reverend Canon Dr Ruth Goatly as our Associate Priest.

Among the topics which have been discussed are:

1. The continual monitoring of the weekly attendances in all three churches. The average number at the Sunday 9.30am service at St John's is in the 90s and we hope the new parking spaces on the south side of the church makes it possible for more people to come. Although

the Wednesday morning Communion services continue to be popular, the one on Monday evenings has seen falling numbers and it was decided that from September 2018 it would now be held fortnightly instead of weekly. Age and illness still affects numbers on a Sunday at St Stephen's, but the Thursday morning Eucharist is maintaining its own and means St Stephen's now has a communion service at least once a week. The numbers at St Francis are holding steady, averaging 12 on a Sunday. It was particularly gratifying that over 1600 people attended one or more services in the 36-hour period from the evening of 23 December to Christmas morning.

2. The arrangements for special services held during the year, of which there have a number of memorable ones, including: the service on St John's Day when The Reverend Laura Jørgensen (nee Burgess) was the preacher; the service on the Parish Fun Day when Abigail Macey was baptised; the Choral Evensong which marked Ben's final service with us; Harvest Thanksgiving; annual services for the Departed; the Royal British Legion Remembrance Day service which marked the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the end of the First World War; the Deanery Confirmation at which 23 candidates were confirmed, of which 8 were from this parish; and the Christmas cycle.
3. Review of the major services which takes place between meetings commenting on what has gone well and noting those things which need to be improved in the future. The series of sermons on our MAP goals has made the congregations more aware of them. The success of Messy Church in January has been noted. It has also been noted that attendance at several special services has been disappointing, such as the Deanery Ascension Day service, the Corpus Christi service to which Chalice Assistants were invited, and the Deanery Confirmation where more support for the candidates would have been welcome.
4. The work of the Choir. Our Director of Music, Keith Beniston, has brought in extra people to augment the choir for special evening services. The Service of Nine Lessons and Carols saw the addition of a small orchestra, which resulted in an attendance of 238. A Junior Choir was launched in January and it is intended to launch four Choir Scholarships.

We would like to express our thanks to all those who, in their various ways, work to ensure that services in the parish are offered to the highest possible liturgical standard.
